





"Downtown" Delhi in the 1850's and 60's

In 1849 father and son, James and George Eaton published a Delaware County Ohio Atlas that not only gave the maps of all the townships of the county but identified the lots/farms and their owners in each township. They did an amazing job of producing a reference book that is used to this day for locating family homes and farm history. The book combined with the 1850 census can provide many genealogists the first solid family information to follow their family descendant branches. *This volume is at the museum and online*.

James Eaton made the original survey of Delhi for Edward Evans in 1833 and is responsible for how Radnor village appears today. Edward Evans purchased Lot 5, tier 3 of the David Pugh survey from the widow of Thomas David between 1818 and 1820. Edward Evans died in 1837 before much of his dream village developed but his survey is the blueprint for the development of the village in the 1850's and 60's when most of the buildings in "Downtown" Radnor were built. Some of the currently existing buildings that were erected during this time are: The Georgian style homes of John and Elizabeth Baker and William and Mary Watkins, the ME church and the Congregational Church buildings, the IOOF building, and the Thomas Morton home and store. These structures continue to provide the attractive small village feel.




Wm. Watkins House erected in 1850



Early IOOF Hall Erected in 1853




Morton House / General Store 1853



The featured buildings are part of the continuing Historical Markers project being done by the Radnor Alumini Association and Radnor Heritage Society and led by Ken Fryman. Ken, with the help of other volunteers, has identified buildings and sites for installation of impressive brass plaques explaining the history of the location. Some of you may have noticed the plaques already installed. Shown below is the plaque for the former IOOF building that is located on the SW corner of 203 and Taylor Streets.



This is a single side plaque, but others have information on both sides. Progress on the plaques is ongoing. We hope to have most of the plaques in place by St. Davids Day 2024. See President's letter for details on plaques.

Thanks to Todd Coonfare and his crew for their work installing the plaques. This project was funded by the Radnor Alumni Association's Pride-in-Radnor initiative led by Ken Fryman. These plaques will live as permanent reminders of the history of Radnor.
